Subject: Road Closure

1. **PURPOSE** – To take the next steps in closing a portion of 45th Street Alix.
2. **BACKGROUND** – Council has agreed to close a portion of 45th Street Alix for the purpose of selling it to Mr. Garrett and Ms. Letendre pending successful completion of all necessary steps. Alberta Transportation and Economic Corridors has already been contacted and has no objection in principle of the proposed closure.
3. **OPTIONS** –
 1. To give first reading to Bylaw 476/23
 2. To accept this report as information
4. **DISCUSSION** – The tentative survey plan has come in which allows us to move to the next step in this process.
5. **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS** – Advertising costs of between \$100 - \$200
6. **LEGAL** – MGA s. 22
 - (1) No road in a municipality that is subject to the direction, control and management of the municipality may be closed except by bylaw.
 - (2) Before giving second reading to a bylaw that would close a road, a council must hold a public hearing with respect to the proposed bylaw in accordance with section 216.4 after giving notice of it in accordance with section 606.
 - (3) No road may be closed by bylaw of the council of a municipality that is not a city unless the bylaw is approved by the Minister of Transportation before it receives second reading.
7. **POLITICAL/PUBLIC IMPLICATIONS** –
8. **OTHER COMMENTS** – Council is able to set a public hearing date for this matter at this time as well. Please see recommended resolutions below. After the public hearing, a road closure submission package is sent to Alberta Transportation and Economic Corridors to be reviewed and approved by the minister. After receiving ministerial approval, the bylaw would come back to Council for 2nd and 3rd readings.
9. **RECOMMENDATIONS** – Option #1, I recommend the following resolutions:

“that the Village of Alix Council hereby gives first reading to Bylaw 476/23, being a Bylaw of the Village of Alix in the Province of Alberta, for the purpose of closing public travel and disposing of a portion of a public highway.”

WEHEREAS the lands hereafter described are no longer required for public travel, and

WEHEREAS application has been made to Council to have the highway closed, and

WEHEREAS the Council of the Village of Alix deems it expedient to provide for a bylaw for the purpose of closing to public travel certain roads, or portions thereof, situated in the said municipality, and therefore disposing of same, and

WEHEREAS notice of the intention of Council to pass a bylaw has been given in accordance with Section 606 of the Municipal Government Act, and [dates of advertising dates, include copies in the road closure package]

WEHEREAS Council [was/was not] petitioned for an opportunity to be heard by any person claiming to be prejudicially affected by the bylaw.

NOW THEREFORE, that the Council of the Village of Alix in the Province of Alberta does hereby close to public travel for the purpose of disposing of the following section of described highway, subject to rights of access granted by other legislation:

Plan 5676 AE
Excepting thereout all mines and minerals



Subject: FCSS Funding

1. **PURPOSE** – To present Council with Family & Community Support Services (FCSS) funding considerations.
2. **BACKGROUND** – In 2020 Council made changes to the method of applying FCSS funds for preventative social services within the Village of Alix. Those changes came into effect January 1, 2021. Community groups or organizations who intend to offer programs or do projects that align with the FCSS mandate are welcome to fill out an application form for funds and submit it to the Village for Council consideration. So far the only funding applications to come in are for the Alix Inform, Moms & Tots and the Community Resource Centre.
3. **OPTIONS** –
 1. To fully and/or partially fund the programs listed below
 2. To require funding applications before granting FCSS funds
 3. To accept this report as information
4. **DISCUSSION** – After 2 years of successful funding transfers to the same organizations, Council may want to consider streamlining the process by allocating funds without requiring an application form. I have confirmed that the programs below are still running and that there have been no significant changes to the programs since last year.
5. **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS** – Under the terms of the funding agreement between the Village and the Province, there is a total of \$29,596 in FCSS funds available in 2023. This amount is \$23,677 Provincial and \$5,919 from the Village. Council is not restricted to a maximum of 25% contribution, but that is all the Interim Operating Budget has allocated.

6. **LEGAL** – FCSS funds must be used in accordance with the FCSS Act and Regulations. All programs listed above meet the mandated requirements for funding
7. **POLITICAL/PUBLIC IMPLICATIONS** – If FCSS funds are fully allocated at this time, there would be no dollars left in the budget should other applications come in later in the year.
8. **OTHER COMMENTS** – Approving funding early in the year will help these organizations as they prepare for their 2023 program year and activities.
9. **RECOMMENDATIONS** – That Council allocates FCSS funding according to the following two resolutions. If the second resolution is passed, two cheques would be sent; one now and one at the start of the third quarter of 2023 to allow better cash flow for the Village.

"that Alix Village Council hereby grants Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) funding to the Alix Family and Community Services Society as follows; \$2,400 for the Alix Inform program and \$4,000 for the Moms and Tots program."

"that Alix Village Council hereby grants Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) funding to Alix Mirror Wellness Supports Society in the amount of \$23,196."

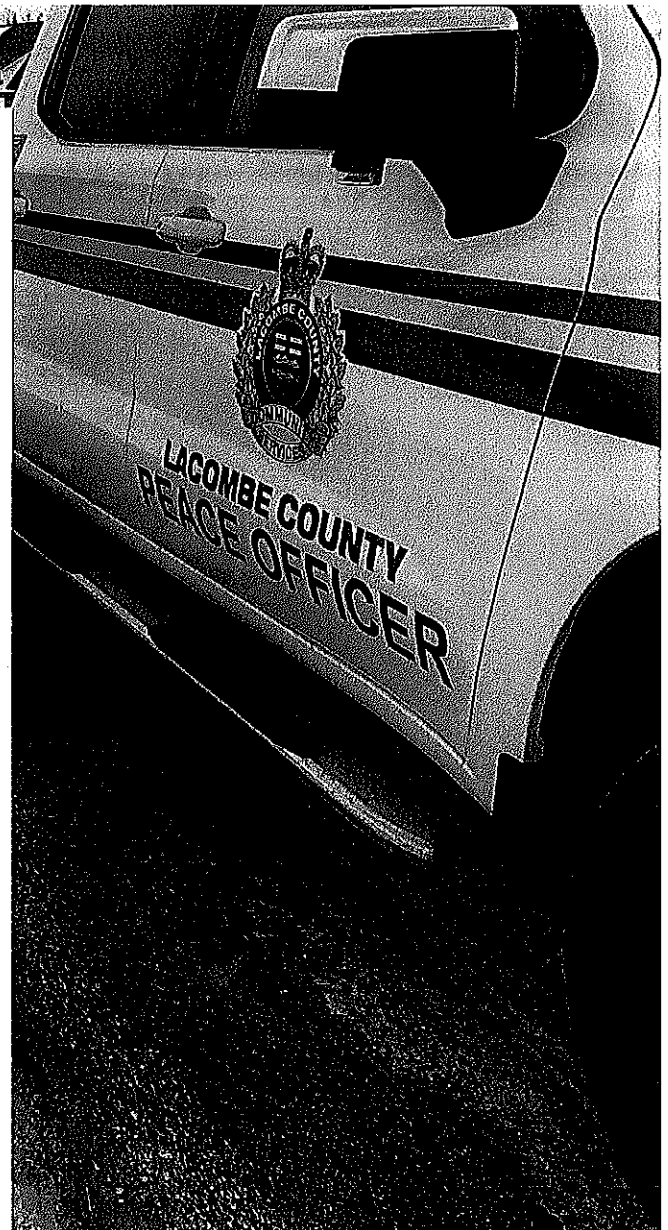
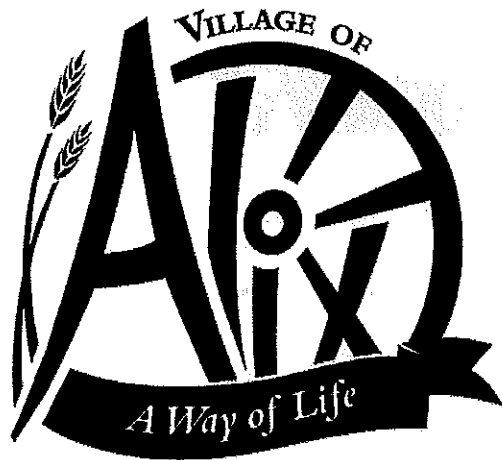

CAO REPORT JANUARY 2023

1. Community Gardens – In alignment with the direction of Council’s Strategic Plan, a meeting was held between municipal staff and Resource Centre Executive Director Jill Hillman regarding the Village of Alix Community Gardens. I’m happy to say Ms. Hillman felt the Community Gardens were a good fit with the Resource Centre programs. They have agreed to take on administration of the Gardens moving forward – effective for the 2023 season.
2. RhPAP – I attended a virtual workshop regarding increased demand/use of Nurse Practitioners in rural Alberta. The workshop was put on by Rural Health Professionals Action Plan. I plan to continue participating in future webinars that may give us insight on how to improve access to health services for our community.
3. Housing Needs Assessment – As part of the provincial “Stronger Foundations: Alberta’s 10 year plan to improve and expand affordable housing” a voluntary Affordable Housing Needs Assessment has been launched. The Assessment is intended to help municipalities understand local needs and distinct local attributes that may uniquely impact affordable housing needs in the area.
4. Railway House – Council may already be aware, Bay 4 of Railway House is about to become available for lease again. Costs associated with the building have not changed significantly since Council set the cost recovery lease rate of \$650 per month plus utilities. Property taxes will be added to costs outlined in any new lease agreement as per our assessor’s requirements to assess the bays leased for commercial purposes. This lease opportunity will be advertised on our website & social media.

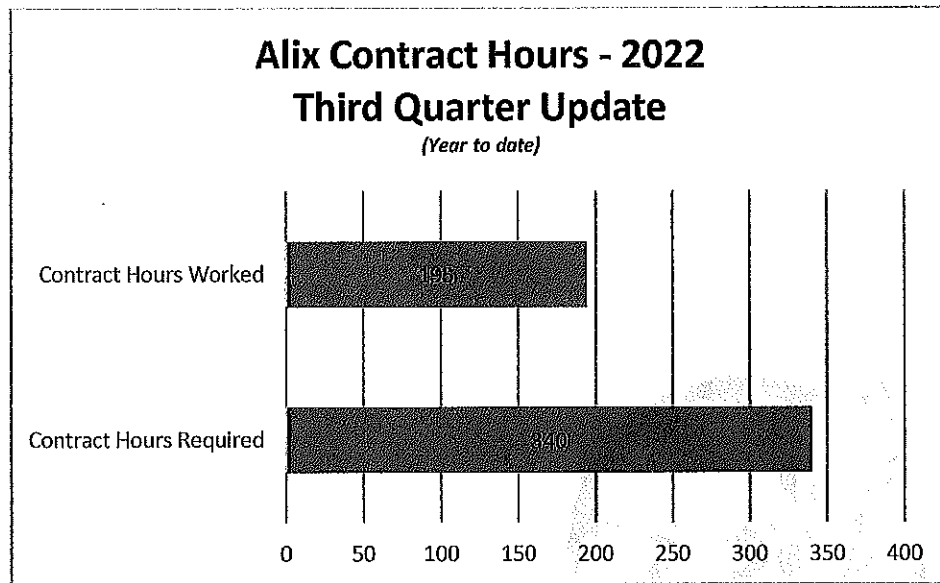

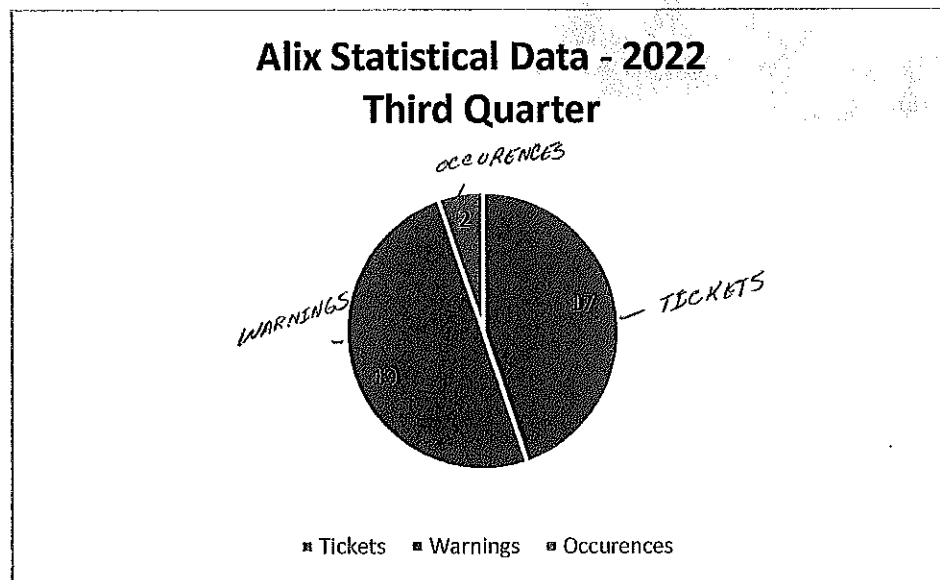

'Data collected from July 1--September 30 as per Section 11, Peace Officer Service Agreement.'


PEACE OFFICER HIGHLIGHTS

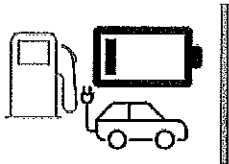

FORTISALBERTA PILOT RATE 62 STANDALONE LEVEL 3 EV CHARGERS

BACKGROUND

Canada has committed that by 2035, all new cars and light-duty trucks sold in the country will be zero-emission vehicles. As a rural electricity distribution owner, FortisAlberta is at the front line of supporting the development of charging infrastructure to further the adoption of electric vehicles in Alberta.

FortisAlberta is happy to announce the Alberta Utilities Commission (AUC) has approved an Electric Vehicle (EV) Fast Charging Service pilot rate, Rate 62, on December 16, 2022. This pilot rate is proposed as an interim measure to support standalone public EV Level 3 charger technologies while utilization is low.

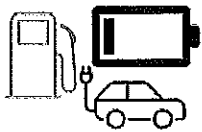
FortisAlberta is working diligently to ensure all internal systems and training requirements are in place to offer this rate to customers. Currently, the anticipated timeline is the second quarter of 2023. Additional information will be provided when it becomes available.

Additionally, 2023 will see FortisAlberta take another important step forward in understanding the charging habits of EV owning customers across rural Alberta, including how residential EV charging impacts FortisAlberta's distribution system. A pilot project was approved by the AUC to explore and manage the demands on Alberta's electricity distribution grid.

OVERVIEW

- The term *pilot* means the rate will be reviewed during the next Phase II application and may or may not be renewed as is or with modifications at that time. Essentially, it is not intended to remain indefinitely.
- Rate 62 is an interim measure to improve the economics of EV Level 3 charger technology for customers. Specifically, addressing high peak metered demand and ratchet demand costs for EV charging station customers when chargers are only being utilized a few times per month.
- The rate's transmission and distribution charges are calculated as outlined on FortisAlberta's Rates, Options, and Riders Schedule effective January 1, 2023. A copy will be made available in the new year and can be found here: [Rates, Options and Riders \(fortisalberta.com\)](http://www.fortisalberta.com/rates-options-and-riders).
- The rate includes investment. As an example:
 - A site with a standalone Level 3 180kW EV charger would receive a base investment of \$6,235.
 - Further to the base investment, \$944 per kW for the first 150kW (\$148,800) is provided.
 - For each kW over 150kW customers receive \$124 of additional investment, so in this example an added \$3,720 (30kW). **The total maximum investment would be \$158,755.**
- The rate calculation is tied to load factors. If load factor is below 4 per cent, it is more economical for customers to be enrolled in the Rate 62 pilot rate. If load factor is above 4per

cent, it is more economical for customers to switch to Rate 61. The threshold of 4 per cent corresponds to approximately 60 minutes of charging per day, or 3 car charges per day.

- **Customers must apply to switch**, it will not happen automatically. With the load factor mechanism, customers should only be enrolled to Rate 62 on a temporary basis.
- Transmission revenues associated with this rate are designed to be recovered through an energy charge (i.e., \$/kWh).
- On the distribution side, System Usage costs and Local Facilities costs will be recovered through an energy charge, while the Service Charge remains the same as Rate 61 (General Service).
- FortisAlberta is expected to report analysis and review of this rate in its next phase II DTA, including the uptake and load factors of customers.
