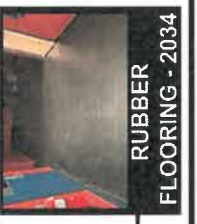
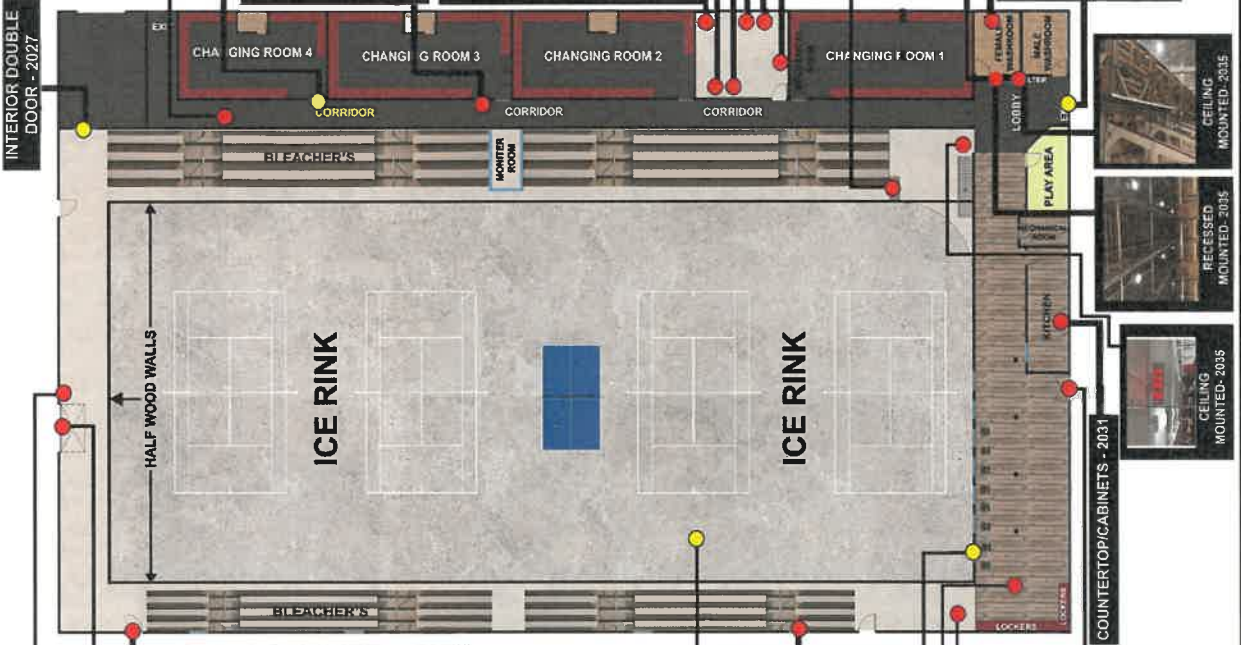
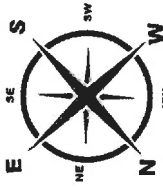
FACILITY CONDITION INDEX OVER 3 YEARS AND OVER 10 YEARS

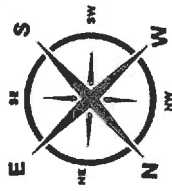

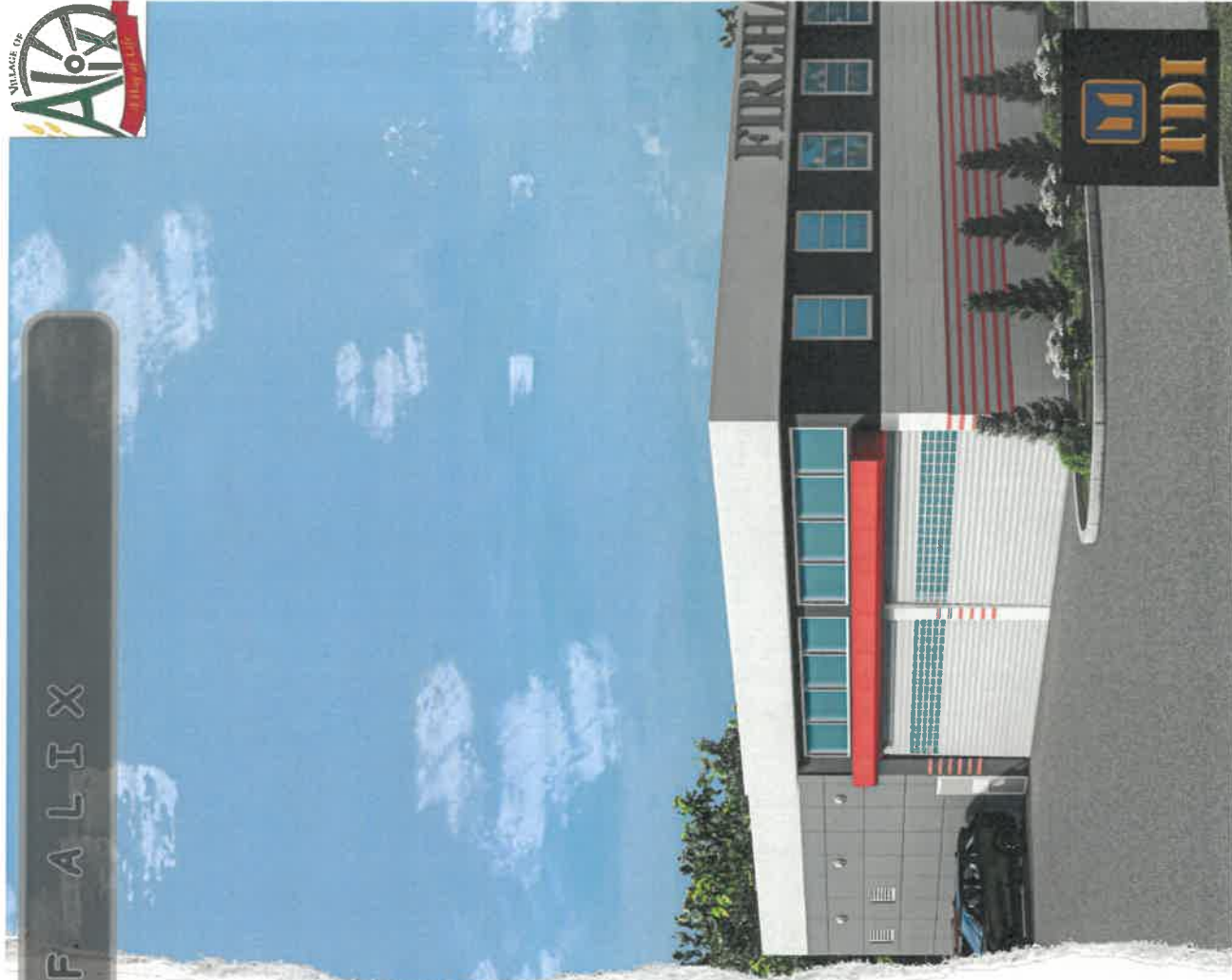
OVERVIEW :

TDI HAS BEEN HIRED BY THE VILLAGE OF ALIX TO DESIGN AND DELIVER A MODERN FIRE HALL FACILITY. THE PROJECT FOCUSES ON FUNCTIONALITY, DURABILITY, AND RAPID RESPONSE OPERATIONS, ENSURING THAT THE FIRE DEPARTMENT CAN SERVE THE COMMUNITY EFFECTIVELY AND EFFICIENTLY.

THE PROPOSED FIRE HALL COVERS A TOTAL AREA OF 5,224.76 SQ.FT. AND IS ORGANIZED WITH TWO VEHICLE BAYS AT THE CORE FOR FIRE TRUCK PARKING, ACCOMPANIED BY A COMPACT YET FULLY FUNCTIONAL SERVICE AND SUPPORT BLOCK AT THE REAR.

THE FACILITY INTEGRATES OPERATIONAL, STORAGE, AND SUPPORT FUNCTIONS WITHIN A STREAMLINED LAYOUT.

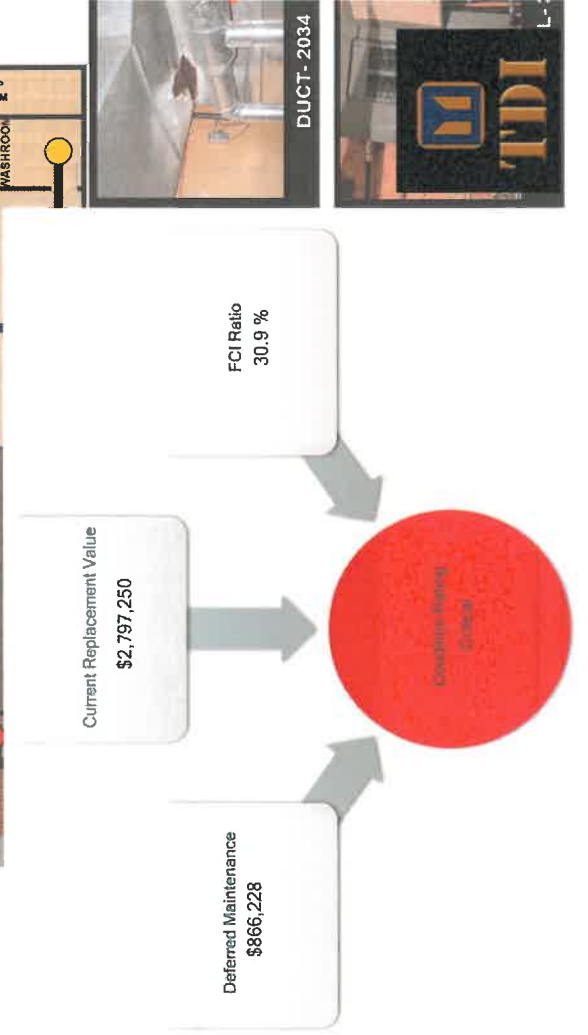
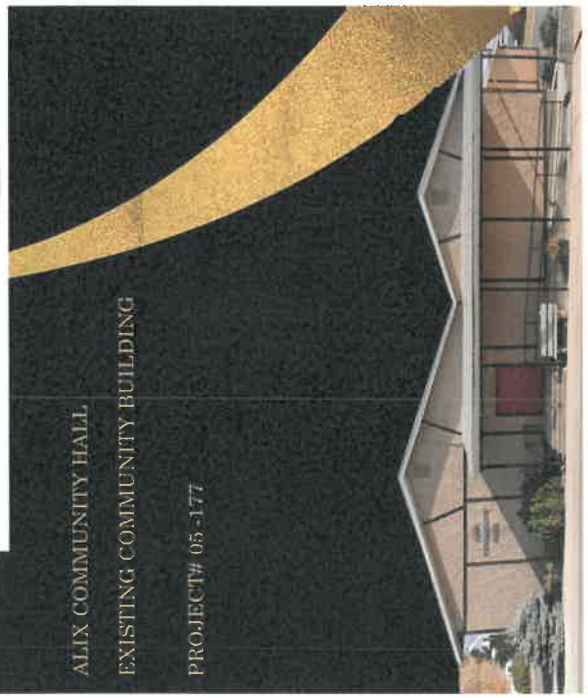
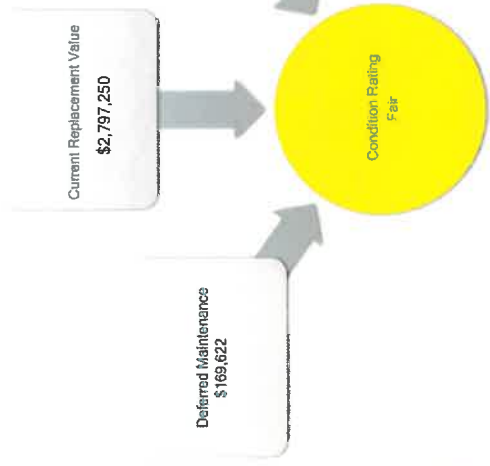
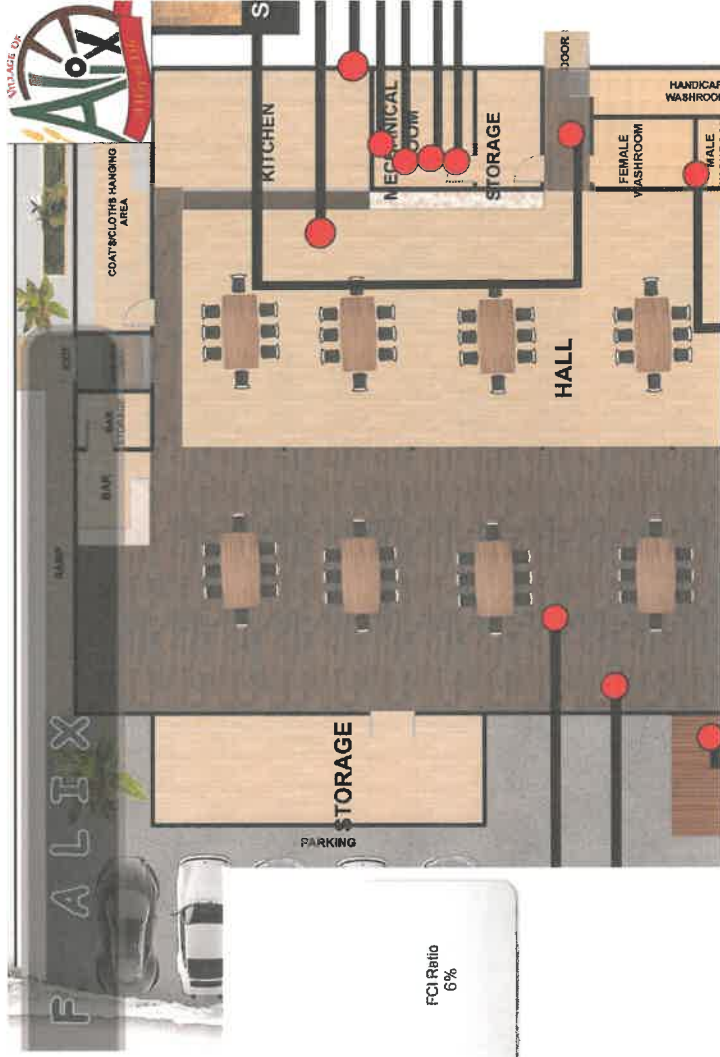

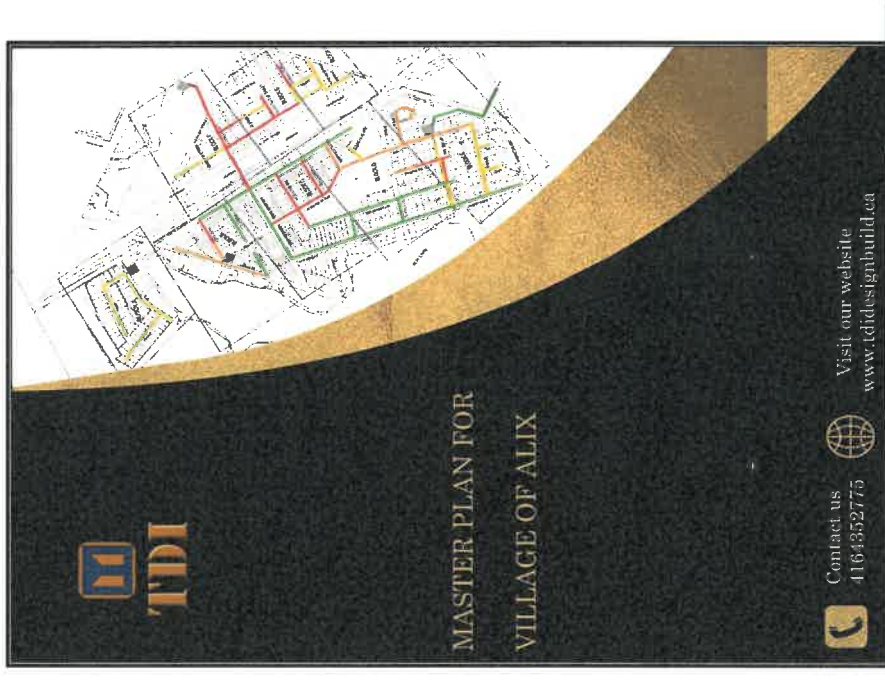

- The linear infrastructures were colour-coded to indicate its condition: green for good, yellow for moderate, orange for fair, and red for poor.

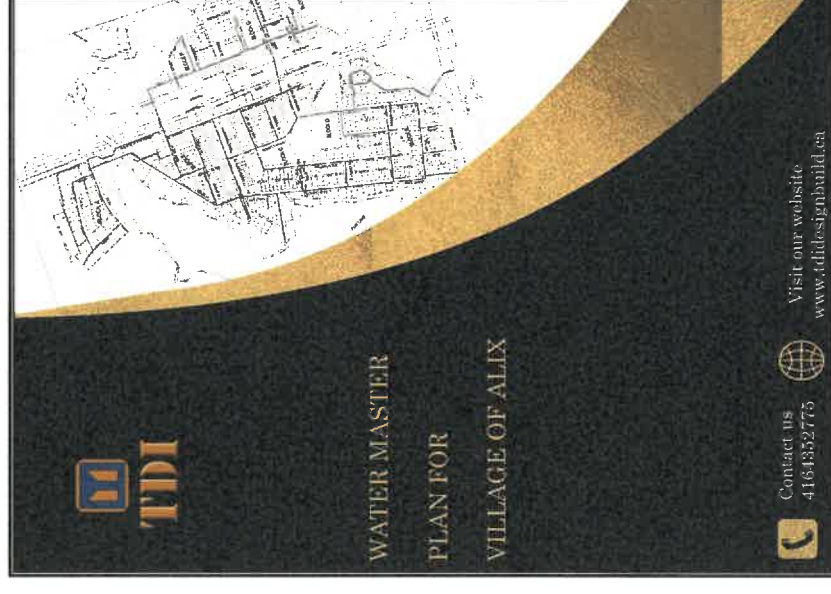

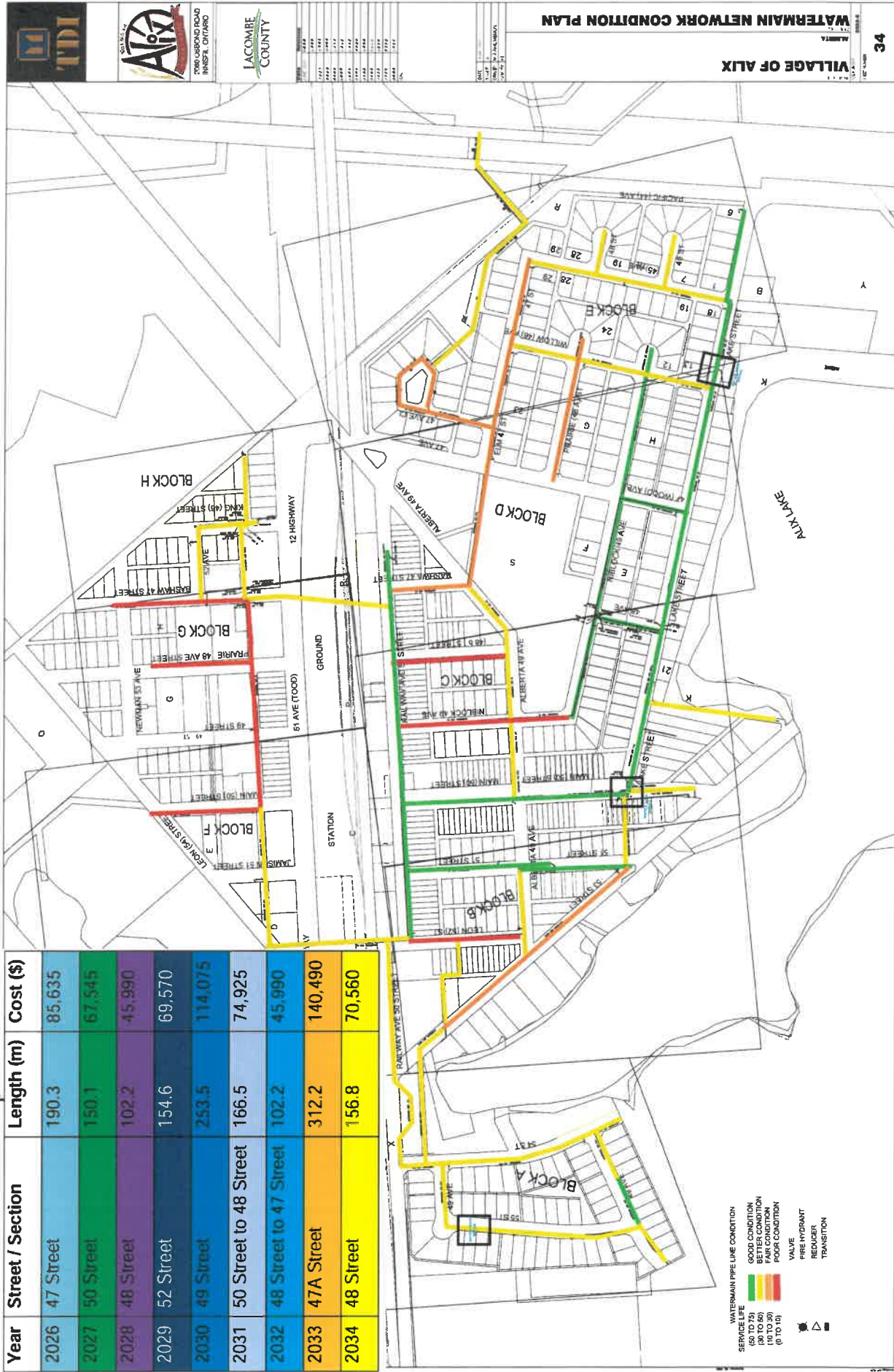


- The Village of Alix's water main - 10.4 kilometres with a replacement value of \$5.6M
- Approximately 15% of the Village's watermains are in better condition.
- The remaining 50% are considered to be in good condition, with less than 30% considered to be in poor condition.
- 5% are considered to be in fair condition.
- PVC 69% & AC 31%- showing the Village's focus on water and sewer improvements.

- The assets covered in the Wastewater Master Plan have a replacement value of approximately \$7.2 million.
- This includes an inventory of over 14.9 kilometer of gravity sewer and 120 maintenance hole structures.
- Condition assessment includes CCTV inspections, which confirm the same results.

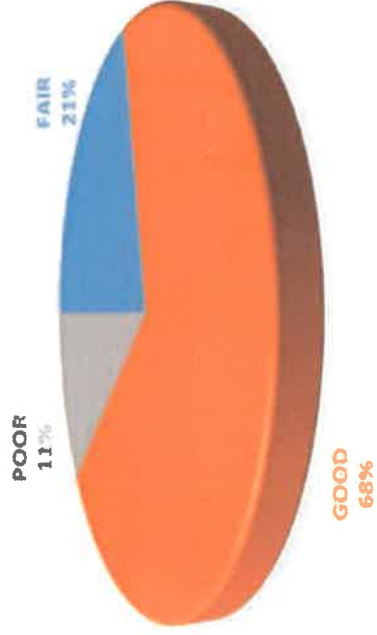


Roads Need Study

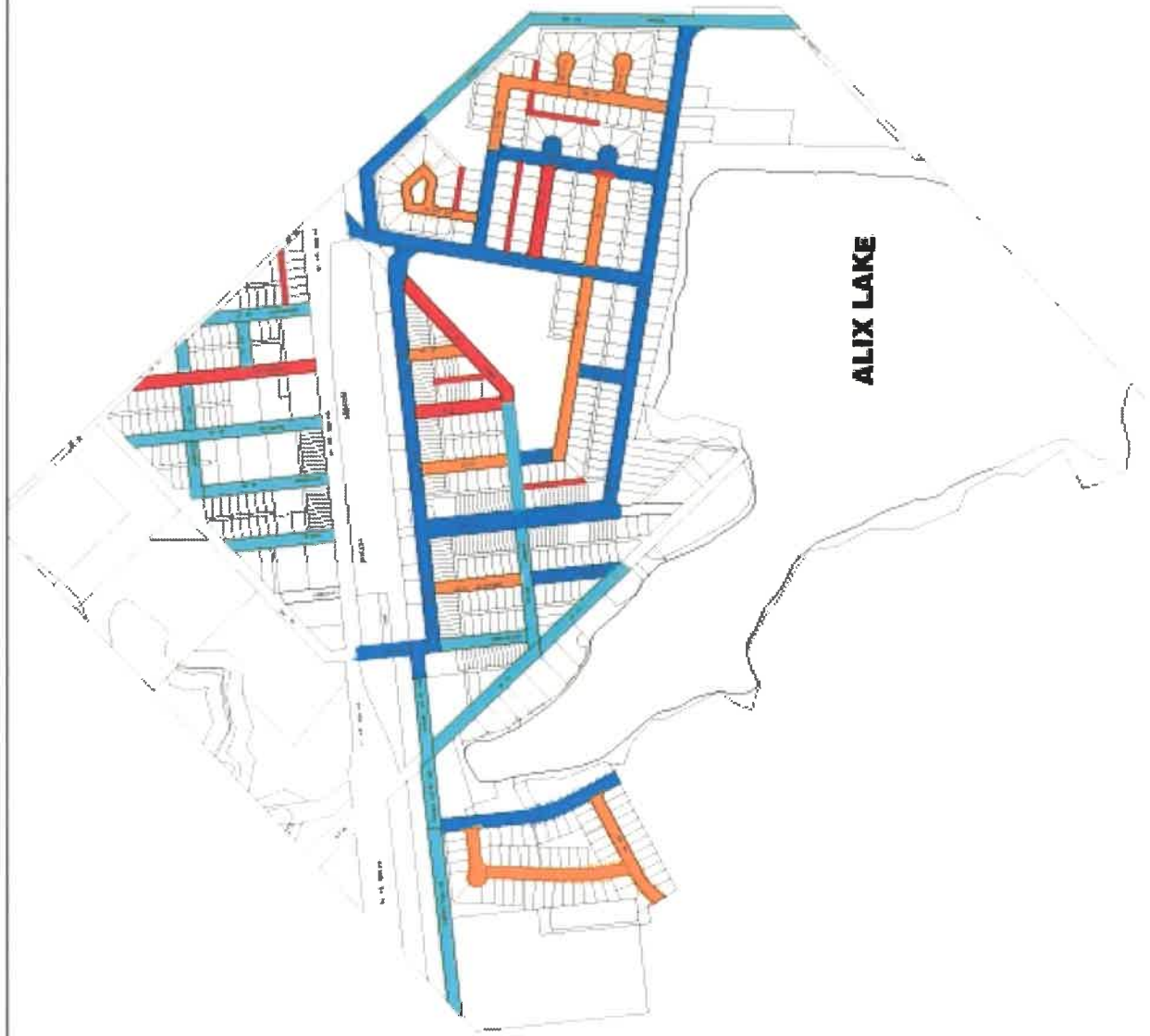

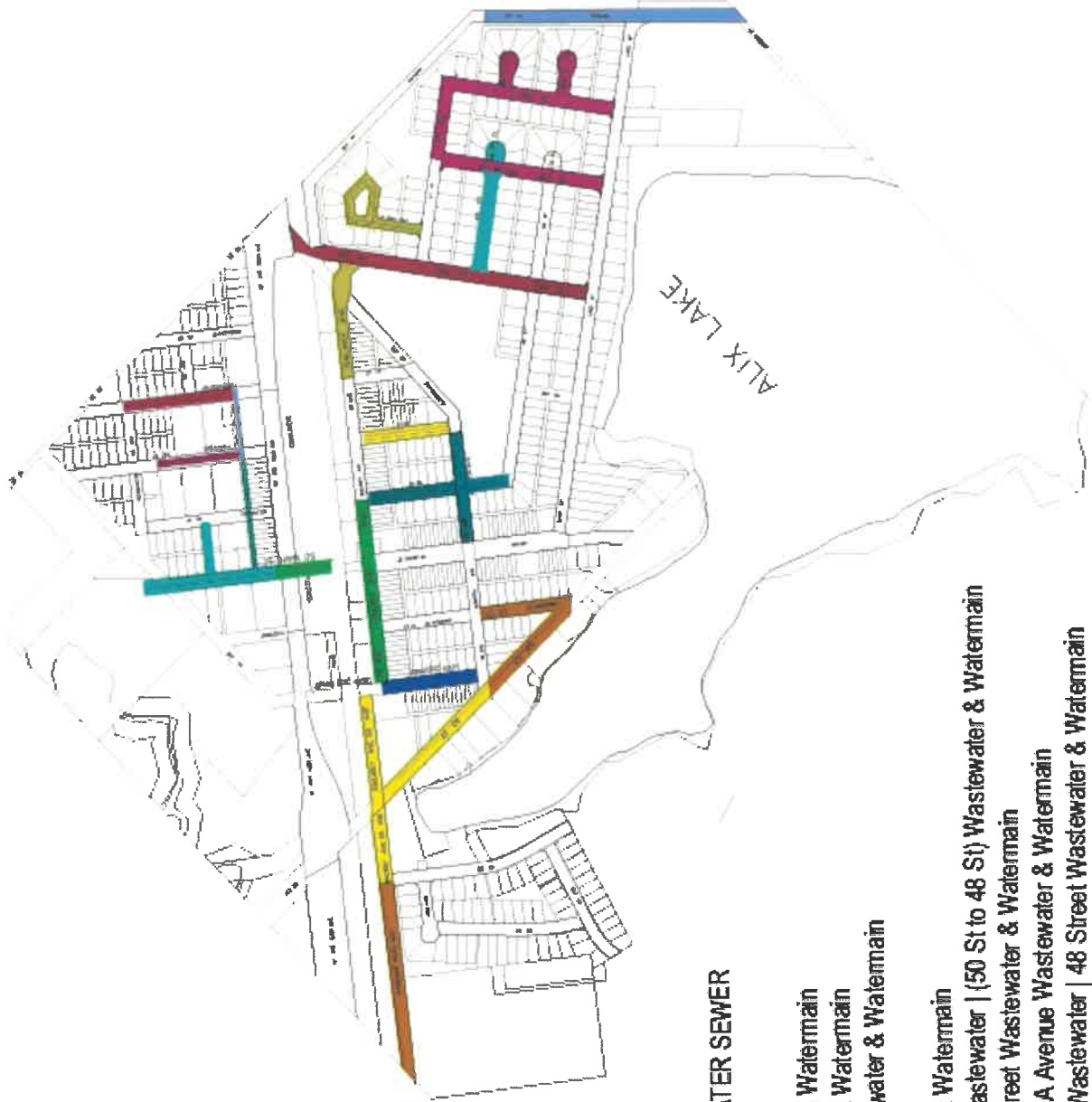

Subject: Public Participation Re: Bylaw Amendment

1. **PURPOSE** – To present Council with a Public Participation Plan regarding the draft amendment to Community Standards Bylaw 465/21. (attached)
2. **BACKGROUND** – Council gave first reading to draft Bylaw 492/26 at the January 21, 2026 meeting. Administration was directed to bring back a Public Participation Plan regarding this bylaw amendment.
3. **OPTIONS** –
 1. To direct staff to carry out the attached Public Participation Plan
 2. To amend the attached Public Participation Plan
 4. To give draft bylaw 492/26 the remaining 2 readings at this time
4. **DISCUSSION** – The proposed change (to not allow parking or storage of Heavy Equipment, Motor Vehicles, Recreational Vehicles or Trailers on vacant residential or commercial lots could be polarizing for the community. Some residents will be glad to see this change, while others may be negatively affected.
5. **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS** – Costs of implementing the Public Participation Plan are approximately \$150.
6. **LEGAL** – Public Participation Policy #36: “Council and Administration recognize that good governance includes encouraging stakeholders involvement through various and appropriate public participation processes by:
 - 1) Identifying circumstances in which stakeholders will be engaged;
 - 2) Promoting sustainable decisions by recognizing various stakeholders interests;
 - 3) Providing stakeholders with the appropriate information and tools to engage in meaningful participation;
 - 4) Communicating clearly and openly about public participation opportunities, its processes and provide factual and evidence based information.
 - 5) Sharing outcomes of public participation, including how the information was used in the decision making process.”
7. **POLITICAL/PUBLIC IMPLICATIONS** – By giving the public a chance to provide feedback before the bylaw is passed, Council will be able to factor in comments received and potentially make amendments to the draft if necessary.
8. **OTHER COMMENTS** –
9. **RECOMMENDATIONS** – Option #1, I recommend the following resolution:

“that Council hereby directs administration to carry out the Public Participation Plan regarding proposed Bylaw No. 492/26.”

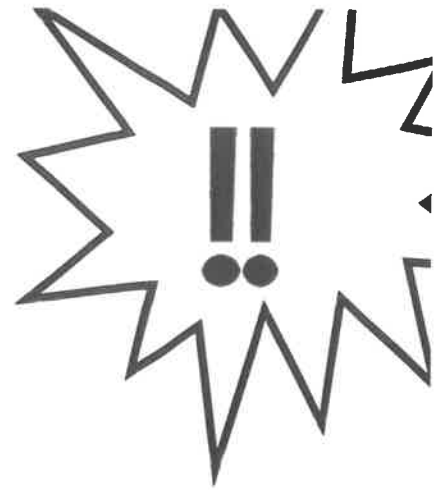

BYLAW AMENDMENT #492/26



Proposed Amendments:

Part 3A: Vacant Lots

3A.1 An Owner of a Vacant Lot is liable for an offence where a Motor Vehicle, Heavy Equipment, Recreational Vehicle, or Trailer is Parked on a Vacant Lot, unless issued a permit in accordance with this Bylaw.

3A.2 An Owner of a Vacant Lot is liable for an offence where a Motor Vehicle, or Trailer is stored on a Vacant Lot, unless issued a permit in accordance with this Bylaw or any other applicable Village of Alix Bylaw.

3A.3 No Person shall stay, camp or sleep in a Recreational Vehicle or Motor Vehicle on a Vacant Lot, unless a permit has been issued pursuant to this Bylaw or any other applicable Village of Alix Bylaw.

3A.4 Notwithstanding Sections 3A.1 to 3A.2, and Owner is not liable for an offence where a Motor Vehicle, Heavy Equipment, Recreational Vehicle, or Trailer, is parked on a Vacant Lot during such time as development of a building, structure, or residence, for which a development permit has been issued, is ongoing.

3A.5 A Person may make a written application to the Chief Administrative Officer for a temporary parking or storage permit allowing for Parking or storage of Motor Vehicles, Heavy Equipment, Recreational Vehicles, or Trailers, that would otherwise violate the Bylaw. Applications made pursuant to this section must be made in writing, in a form approved by the Chief Administrative Officer.

3A.6 The Chief Administrative Officer may, in their sole unfettered discretion, approve, revoke or impose conditions on the issuance of any permit the Chief Administrative Officer considers appropriate.

3A.7 For the purposes of prosecuting an offence under this Bylaw, the onus of proving that a permit has been issued by the Chief Administrative Officer rests with the owner.

Schedule "A" to Bylaw No. 465/21, the Village of Alix Community Standards Bylaw, is hereby amended by including after the Part 3 – Unsanitary Premises Specified Penalties, the following Part 3A – Recreational Vehicles and trailers Specified Penalties:

3A.1 Parked Heavy Equipment, Motor Vehicle, RV or Trailer on Vacant Lot

- *1st offence - \$100, 2nd offence - \$200, 3rd offence - \$500*

3A.2 Store Heavy Equipment, Motor Vehicle, RV or Trailer on Vacant Lot

- *1st offence - \$100, 2nd offence - \$200, 3rd offence - \$500*

3A.3 Camp in an RV on Vacant Lot

- *1st offence - \$100, 2nd offence - \$200, 3rd offence - \$500*

1. **PURPOSE** – To inform Council of the request to Council made by Mrs. MacLeod's grade 3/4 class for 5 memorial trees.
2. **BACKGROUND** – Students sent the attached letter to Mayor and Council asking for 5 memorial trees within Alix. The letter came with 15 drawings from the students that will be displayed on the walls of Council Chambers during the meeting.
3. **OPTIONS** –
 1. To approve the request
 2. To approve the request and make it part of the Rahr Park Playground re-build
 3. To approve the request contingent on a portion of the purchase costs being provided by the students
 4. To deny the request
4. **DISCUSSION** – Council may want to consider adding a dollar value to this project in the resolution if options 1, 2 or 3 are chosen.
5. **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS** – Cost will vary depending on the size and type of trees selected. I would estimate \$800 - \$1,500 for 5 trees plus staff time for planting.
6. **LEGAL** – Many of the drawings show the trees located along the Alix Nature Trail. Unfortunately under the terms of the Village's lease of the Crown Land surrounding the lake, adding or removing vegetation/trees can be complicated.
7. **POLITICAL/PUBLIC IMPLICATIONS** – These students have followed proper procedure for making a request of Council. It's so nice to see youth expressing an interest in their community and in local government.
8. **OTHER COMMENTS** – I recommend that the students / school be responsible for any memorial tagging of the trees. (eg. Small name plaque on a chain around the trunk of each tree)
9. **RECOMMENDATIONS** – Option #2. Staff could work up 3 placement options for the trees within Rahr Park and allow the students to choose their preferred location. I recommend the following resolution:

“that the Village of Alix Council hereby approves the purchase and planting of 5 trees as requested by the students of Mrs. MacLeod's grade 3/4 class as part of the Rahr Park re-build project.”

Subject: Municipal Leaders Caucus

1. **PURPOSE** – To determine if Council would like to send a representative to the Spring Municipal Leaders Caucus. See attached for Caucus details.
2. **BACKGROUND** – Many times over the last several years, Alix has sent the Mayor and CAO to the Fall Municipal Leaders Caucus. The fall sessions are held regionally. Often there is one within comfortable driving distance and they are only one day long. The spring sessions are always in Edmonton over one and a half days.
3. **OPTIONS** –
 1. To continue attending the regional fall sessions only
 2. To send the Mayor to the Spring Caucus
 3. To send the Mayor and CAO to the Spring Caucus
4. **DISCUSSION** – The agenda for the spring session will be focusing on three topics that affect our community: changes to the Local Authorities Election Act, the future of policing and municipal finance relating to grants and property taxes.
5. **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS** – Legislative costs (council member) approx. \$1,050 (includes registration, mileage, remuneration & hotel x2 nights). Administrative costs (CAO) approx. \$850 (includes registration, mileage & hotel x2 nights)

All expenses could be accommodated in the Interim Operating Budget except for the Mayor Travel & Subsistence category. This line currently budgets for committee meetings and AbMunis Convention attendance only. If option 1 or 2 is chosen, this line would need to be amended in the spring when the budget is finalized.

6. **LEGAL** – Remuneration and Expense Policy #35: “Conventions, courses and seminars are those conventions, courses, seminars that pertain to Council, Municipal Affairs, and/or municipal concerns. Attendance shall be approved by motion of Council and a maximum of two conventions, or seminars, or courses per Council member are allowed each budget year, in addition to the Alberta Municipalities Convention. The Mayor or members of Council qualify for per diem remuneration.”

NOTE: Mandatory post-election training does not constitute a convention, seminar or course.

7. **POLITICAL/PUBLIC IMPLICATIONS** – The provincial government is making many decisions that directly affect municipalities at a very fast pace with little or no consultation. This makes it very difficult to stay on top of emerging trends, new demands on our budget and legislative changes we have to follow.
8. **OTHER COMMENTS** –
9. **RECOMMENDATIONS** – Option #3. I recommend the following resolution:

“that the Village of Alix Council hereby approves Mayor Gilliat and CAO White to attend the Alberta Municipalities Spring 2026 Municipal Leaders Caucus.”

CAO REPORT FEBRUARY 2026

1. Municipal Assessment – Would Council be interested in having our assessor attend a meeting as a delegation? Alix contracts Wild Rose Assessment Services to do the legislated annual assessment process for the Village. Riley has offered to come to a meeting and speak with Council regarding the assessment process, market/assessment trends and answer any questions you may have. Please let me know if you would like me to book him in for an upcoming meeting.
2. Alberta Lake Management Society – I contacted ALMS and asked if Alix Lake could be part of the 2026 Lake Watch water quality testing program. This would provide us with post-dredging data regarding lake water quality. I also explained that we hope to begin pumping from the river into the lake in 2027. ALMS is very excited about that news. We are added to their 2026 testing and they would like to return to do more testing in 2027 & 2028 to determine the impacts of pumping on lake water quality.
3. Post Election Training – As of mid-January, all members of Council have completed all required training. Thank you to everyone for your time and commitment to fit all of it in to your busy schedules. Many municipalities have provided feedback regarding the new training requirements and tight timelines under the Local Authorities Election Act... we are hopeful adjustments will be made and more realistic legislation can be put in place before the next election.
4. Lacombe Regional Emergency Management Partnership – Director of Emergency Management, Janene Anderson and I attended an ‘after action’ report on the overland wildfire training event put on by LREMP last fall. By all accounts, the event was very successful and provided an excellent opportunity for regional partners to meet and work with our Emergency Management partners from around the region.

LREMP is very close to finalizing a new Agreement between the partners. It has taken over a year to re-write and is now with Alberta Emergency Management Agency for review before it goes to the LREMP Advisory Committee for consideration and approval.

5. Annual Audit – Staff are continuing with year end procedures and preparation of audit materials in anticipation of the upcoming audit. This is always a labour intensive process / time of year for admin staff. We appreciate your patience with us if it takes longer than usual for turn-around time on replies & requests for information.

Renewed Police Funding Model Preliminary 5-year Estimate for Village of Alix

Thank you for connecting with the Police Funding Model team and for providing a designated contact to receive your estimated municipal contributions under the renewed Police Funding Model (PFM). Based on the most recent data available to the ministry, we have prepared a preliminary five-year estimate to assist with your municipal budget process for PFM costs moving forward, effective April 1, 2026.

It is important to note that the estimate provided is an approximation. Final amounts payable under the renewed PFM will be based on current data when calculations are completed each March.

- All figures are subject to revision.
- Base cost calculations are derived from 2024–25 PPSA frontline policing actuals, with an assumed year-over-year increase of 8% applied to PPSA frontline policing costs.
- The five-year projection is based on Municipal Affairs 2024–25 population data, equalized assessment values, preliminary RCMP occurrence statistics, and RCMP hard vacancy rates. Final invoiced amounts will reflect updated data as it becomes available.
- Modifications to the base formula will be implemented in phases: the weighted occurrences factor will take effect on April 1, 2028, with full model implementation completed by April 1, 2030.

Dear Mayors, Councillors, and CAOs,

Earlier this month, about 1.6 million Albertans who live in and around Calgary experienced a massive water-main break that required immediate repairs and attracted national media attention. In that moment, Calgary's staff and elected leaders stepped up to communicate and address the challenge. And while Calgary hit the news, they aren't the only municipality that has experienced these types of emergencies. I am so proud of Alberta's municipal staff and elected leaders who are there for our residents in times of crisis.

As a municipal leader, you know that your community could experience similar emergencies at any time depending on the age and condition of your water and wastewater systems. Numerous communities in Alberta have experienced major water main breaks or boil water advisories in recent years, but it's not always picked up by media.

To draw attention to the water infrastructure challenges facing all municipalities, [Alberta Municipalities wrote an op-ed](#) that was published by *The Calgary Herald* on January 23 and seven other Postmedia newspapers over the weekend.

If you wish to engage with local reporters on this issue, here are some suggested key messages for your use:

- A safe water system is critical to the daily life of our residents and local businesses.
- Underground water and wastewater infrastructure is difficult to inspect and costly to repair.
- We hope the Governments of Alberta and Canada will take a good look at the amount of funding provided to communities for water and wastewater infrastructure.
- We are particularly concerned about the lack of funding in the most recent federal budget which includes the requirement to reduce development charges which is not helpful in Alberta.
- There is incredible pressure on municipal governments to keep municipal property taxes low but Alberta Municipalities' [Property Taxes Reimagined](#) website is shining a light on how the cost of this infrastructure is rising but municipal governments are getting less help.
- Talk about a major project your community is facing or recently overcame.

If you haven't already done so, we encourage you to help promote our [Property Taxes Reimagined](#) information through your municipality's website and social media. The attachment offers sample wording and other key messages that we previously shared with you in November 2025.

Opinion: Protect local water systems by turning on provincial funding tap

If there's one lesson Albertans can take from Calgary's recent water-main crisis, it's that our municipal water and wastewater infrastructure is far more fragile than most of us realize.

For the past several weeks, we watched as Calgary raced to repair a major break in its Bearspaw South feeder main. This disruption made national headlines because 1.6 million Albertans rely on Calgary's system, but the unsettling truth is this: Calgary is not unique.

Across Alberta, communities large and small face similar vulnerabilities. Beiseker, Cochrane, Edmonton, Lethbridge and Three Hills have all experienced major water or wastewater system emergencies in the past three years. While these incidents didn't draw national attention, they imposed real costs — financial, social and environmental — on those who call these communities home.

In conversations with mayors across the province, Alberta Municipalities' board of directors has heard that the biggest issue facing Alberta's municipal governments today is the urgent need for more water and wastewater infrastructure. They simply can't support and sustain their communities' growth without it.

Alberta's unanticipated population growth has not been matched by proportionate provincial or federal investment. Municipalities are being stretched thin as they attempt to replace failing pipes, increase capacity for new development and keep basic services running without burdening residents with steep tax increases.

The result? Deferred maintenance: a short-term necessity that creates long-term risk.

Every year that essential repairs are postponed, small leaks multiply, systems deteriorate faster and costs grow. Calgary's water woes underscore how a single failure can cascade into widespread economic and social disruption.

If it can happen in Alberta's largest city, what does it mean for hundreds of smaller communities operating with fewer staff and smaller budgets?

This is not a hypothetical concern. Municipal leaders tell us they are already forced to make difficult trade-offs, delaying water projects to fund road work or other needs. Critical infrastructure should never be pitted against other critical infrastructure.

Municipalities across Alberta are already playing their part. They plan carefully, manage assets responsibly and spend their allocated funds wisely to keep water safe and flowing. But they can't do it without receiving additional support and funding from the provincial and federal governments.

Without this ongoing funding, more communities will face more frequent disruptions, higher long-term costs and greater barriers to growth.

Municipalities need a renewed, long-term commitment to the infrastructure that keeps our communities functioning. They require predictable, stable and sufficient provincial funding

for municipal infrastructure in recognition of the scale and urgency of the problems our communities face.

And it needs to happen now, before the next water emergency hits. It's far less expensive to invest in advance than it is to respond to an emergency.

As outlined in ABmunis' Property Taxes Reimagined information project, the existing revenue streams available to local governments have changed. They are no longer sufficient to cover costs and local infrastructure deficits.

Without increased provincial and federal funding, the future of Alberta's water and wastewater systems will look a lot like Calgary's water-main break: visible, disruptive and, in hindsight, largely preventable.

ABmunis is hopeful that the three levels of government can work together to address this issue with the urgency and optimism expressed by Calgary Mayor Jeremy Farkas last week to build a better and more resilient future for all Albertans.
